



Supporters Unite for Ninth-Annual Color the World Orange™ for CRPS/RSD Awareness

The ninth-annual Color The World Orange™, aimed at spreading awareness of complex regional pain syndrome (CRPS), also known as reflex sympathetic dystrophy (RSD), is Nov. 7, 2022. Held globally on the first Monday of November each year, the event seeks to bring attention to this poorly understood pain disorder.

Around the world, more than 170 buildings, landmarks and bridges, including Niagara Falls, the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland, Ohio, Pier 17 at South Street Seaport in New York, Gillette Stadium in Foxborough, Massachusetts, Christchurch Airport Terminal and Tower in Christchurch, New Zealand, City Hall in Dublin, Ireland, the CN Tower in Toronto, and Brisbane City Hall in Brisbane, Australia, are scheduled to be lit orange for this year's Color The World Orange™.
